### **Ritual Matters for May 2017**

There are some exciting things coming down the pike. We started the ball rolling with our "What's 'NU' with Services", where we alternate the Saturday services venue between chapel and sanctuary, based on feedback received. The most exciting changes to come start in June and will continue on a trial basis throughout the summer months. A quick overview is noted below but please read more about it elsewhere in this bulletin. We ask that you keep an open mind and bear with us as we take our Saturday services down some varied and exciting paths.

Saturday Shabbat Services in June, July and August will alternate through four different versions or styles – one for each Shabbat of the month. The four services are a) Traditional Shabbat in the sanctuary b) Mayim Chaim Shabbat in the Sanctuary c) Shabbat Simcha in the chapel and d) Kol Haneshama in the chapel. We hope that the mix of these new approaches pleases our congregants, understanding that this will all be trial period. We want to hear from you, so please, please give us your feedback with each service style and gives us as much reasoning as possible behind your likes and dislikes. RITCOM can only respond to you if you respond to us! Again, read more about these upcoming planes elsewhere in the bulletin.

Here's more exciting news coming your way: Back by popular demand, Cantor Lubin will once again be joining us for the 5778 High Holy Days come this fall. We know that having Cantor Lubin's wonderful participation in our services is a big asset to us and to the community at large and we are very pleased to host him again this year.

We hope everyone had a wonderful Pesah and now it's time for the next holiday - Shavuot! Shavuot services will be held in the Chapel on Wednesday, May 31 at 9:30 am and on Thursday, June 1 at 9:30 am. Yizkor will be recited at the June 1 service.

The RITCOM serves and responds to the Etz Chaim community and we welcome and appreciate all of your thoughts, comments and suggestions. Please don't hesitate to give us your feedback so that we may respond as best we can. We thank you for both your interest and support in Etz Chaim ritual affairs.

So, we are excited to announce the roll out of our new Summer Services.


We have created four separate Shabbat Morning Services. Each Shabbat will be held three times during the summer months on a rotating basis.

#### **Shabbat Simcha**

Simcha means joy. This service will be coordinated by Hank and Chava. We have been working to create a service that brings to light the happiness and joy that is inherent in our religion. We have survived generations of persecution and still kept our yiddisha neshama, our Jewish soul. We believe that's due to a love of our faith and an innate desire to feel joy. Shabbat can be this island of simcha in a busy week. This high energy two-hour service is designed to fill your needs and send you on your way. It will feature the basic framework of a traditional Shabbat morning service but will be abridged to teach new tunes, include English and boost the ruach. This service will have regular Torah Reading with interactive Torah trivia to encourage congregants to read along in English. In lieu of a Haftorah this service will offer a component entitled "Torah in Today's World," a take home idea that can be applied to everyday life. It's a two-hour commitment of time out of your week that is full of learning and simcha.

#### **Traditional Shabbat**



This is the Shabbat morning service you think of when you remember coming as a child to shul or that your Zeide would attend. Traditional Shabbat will feature well-known tunes. the full service and a full Haftorah. It will also feature an insightful d'var torah. This service will revive the familiar and classic concept of "Shabbat morning services." In Judaism, the way to refer to someone who leads the prayers is "Shaliach Tzibbur" meaning "messenger on behalf of the congregation." We will be their kehillah, their community. When they lead, we will follow; when they say V'imru we'll say Amen. This service will evoke memories of days gone by and yet create pathways between our modern lives and our relationship with Hashem (God).

#### **Mayim Chaim Shabbat**

The name Mayim Chaim means "water of life." We used this title to convey the key concept behind this Shabbat, making Torah part of our everyday lives. We cannot survive three days without water, so too as Jews we cannot go three days without Torah. This Shabbat will be centered around the Torah reading and include thematic elements from the weekly parsha in the d'var, Kiddush menu and centerpieces. We will bring the biblical stories to life through food and other creative storytelling methods. This Shabbat will showcase our large group of lay leaders. It will feature an abridged Haftorah and davener's choice of tunes. Both amidahs will be

#### Neshama Shel Shabbat



The service will be coordinated by Lynne and Candy. It will include lots of singing, and a bit more English than the traditional service. "Kavvanot" will weave teachings into the structure of the service itself, to facilitate a deeper understanding and connection to our liturgy. The service will include all the key elements and structure of the service, but will focus more on the *kavvanah* (the feeling behind the prayer) than the *kevah* (fixed structure). The Torah service will be abbreviated (with 3 aliyot according to the custom of some liberal streams of Judaism), and musaf will be highly abbreviated, in order to allow time for an extended Torah discussion. This service is designed for people who are looking for a more informal service, with lots of singing. We will help deepen each other's connection to the liturgy and engage in the service from multiple emotional, intellectual, and spiritual perspectives.

Whenever we recognize that we have the opportunity to reach out to our congregants living at Cedar village, we do our best to make it happen. We jumped at the opportunity once again on March 19, 2017. It has become a tradition that following the Purim shpiel performance at our synagogue, we give an encore performance to the residents of Cedar Village on the Cedar Village stage. It is open to all residents and to all of our congregants that missed the production at Purim, as well as to all the guests visiting residents at Cedar Village that day. This year, as in years before, we played to a full house. As soon as the music began, the few empty seats were quickly filled by onlookers and the performance by the cast began.

The cast members were in full makeup and costumes on March 19<sup>th</sup> and the audience k'veld over the performance of *Kats* A *Purr...sian Purim Tail* and the opportunity to enjoy the music of Andrew Lloyd Webber sung to the lyrics of Chaya Vidal, the playwright.

Our cast each year volunteers to give up a couple months of Sundays for practices and to learn the play in order to perform it during Purim. Most of the members agree, the mitzvah opportunity to bring the performance to the residents of Cedar Village is the highlight of the work effort they put into making the mini play come to life.

Following the performance, cast members went in to the audience to take pictures with and to talk with the residents of Cedar Village. A shared sense of joy was felt by everyone in the hall. The cast stayed at Cedar Village quite a while with the residents.

When a group of us, which included 3 cast members, next returned to Cedar Village for our Trivia night, an activity Hank leads every 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of each month, we brought a poster with us highlighting pictures of the cast members with the audience. We put it in the lobby. There immediately was a small crowd gathered around it re-living the afternoon. During that trivia session, after noticing what was happening in the lobby, one of the cast members attending the trivia night was asked, and agreed, to give an encore performance of one of the songs to a round of applause.

We may not always realize how large a small act of giving or kindness impacts others. Sometimes you get the opportunity to see a glimpse of the gratitude and joy. We do a lot of outreach to the community at Etz Chaim. We have programs like trivia night at Cedar Village, serving meals at the Over the Rhine soup kitchen, the Purim shpiel performances, just to name just a few. We encourage you to participate. 




